New Approach in Understanding Breast Cancer

A new study published in the August issue of *JAMA Oncology* has led to new insights on treating ductal carcinoma in situ (DCIS). Usually defined as "stage zero" cancer, it is a cluster of abnormal cells thought to be a "pre-tumor" that are increasingly identified as mammogram equipment becomes more sophisticated. In this study, the authors found that traditional treatment - usually surgery and radiation - did not improve the 20-year survival rate. This could lead to a major shift in how oncologists approach treatment for women diagnosed with DCIS.

Moving Closer to a Universal Flu Vaccine

While the yearly influenza vaccine protects against several subtypes of the virus, it doesn't protect against them all. Scientists have made an important discovery toward a universal flu vaccine. The researchers are studying part of a virus protein that is present in all flu subtypes and is unlikely to vary from virus to virus. The hope is that people will make antibodies that recognize this part of the virus and provide broad protection from flu.

[German Chancellor Fellowship of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation](#)

Each year, the German Chancellor Fellowship for prospective leaders gives up to 50 highly talented young professionals from Brazil, China, India, Russia and the USA the opportunity to spend a year in Germany enhancing their professional qualifications. Working with a host and mentor of their choice, the fellows implement independently developed projects in their respective field, e.g. in politics, business, society, culture or the media. The fellowship programme is under the patronage of the Chancellor of the Federal Republic of Germany.

Deadline for applications is September 15, 2015.

[BBRG Affiliated Scholars Program](#)

The BBRG Affiliated Visiting Scholars Program is designed to accommodate scholars who would like to spend a relatively short period of time in residence, ranging from one month to six months. The BBRG Affiliated Visiting Scholars Program is open to senior and junior faculty (tenured and untenured), visiting scholars, postdoctoral scholars and independent scholars, from the U.S. and abroad, whose work is centrally on women and gender. Applicants must have the Ph.D. (or its equivalent) in hand one year prior to the beginning of the appointment. (Applications accepted throughout the academic year)

[Small Business Postdoctoral Research Diversity Fellowship](#)

The Small Business Postdoctoral Research Diversity Fellowship program aims to encourage creative and highly-trained recipients of doctoral degrees in NSF-supported science, technology, engineering and mathematical disciplines to engage in hands-on research projects in their areas of expertise at the kind of small innovative businesses that historically have fueled the nation's economic regime. Each research fellow will receive a stipend of at least \$75,000 plus health insurance benefits.

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
