Several organizations now offer special fellowship programs for women (and men) to return to scientific research careers after a career gap. One such organization, the Daphne Jackson Trust, recently reported results from a survey of ~200 former fellows. Approximately 50% had taken their leave in the early career stages (<6 years research experience). Of the respondents, 90% said that the fellowship helped them get jobs and 72% reported that they were able to get their career of choice. Programs such as this offer personal mentorship and professional development courses to help returning fellows succeed.

Facebook Launches TechPrep

In collaboration with McKinsey & Company, Facebook conducted a survey on the participation of underrepresented minorities in programming careers. They found that "50% of Blacks and 42% of Hispanics say they would be good at working with computers" despite being underrepresented in computer science careers. More than 77 % of lower income parents and guardians reported not knowing how to help their child pursue a career in computer science. The results suggest that "lower access to both people and programs is a major driver of Black and Hispanic drop-off when pursuing programming as a career path." The TechPrep site seeks to help parents, guardians, and learners understand more about computer science and programming.

Autopilot Feature Eliminates Driving Frustrations

Tesla recently released an autopilot mode to its cars allowing the car to dodge other swerving cars, stop for pedestrians, change lanes automatically and parallel park. Autopilot will not operate if it is unable to see road markings, and Tesla ensured the car would alert the driver with a loud noise to indicate the need to switch back to manual operation. Perhaps most importantly for commuters, the autopilot mode on Tesla is able to drive in stop and go traffic during rush hour.

The Science behind Hangry

Many people have experienced what has been termed 'hangry' - anger due to hunger. Now, scientists are studying this state to help understand treatments for obesity and aggression. Scientists at the University of Sydney in Australia believe that the aggression manifested when hungry is actually a survival mechanism. American Cancer Society Recommends Mammograms to Start at 45

Mammography is not perfect. There is increasing evidence that false-positive results lead to unnecessary biopsies and that it is less useful for younger women with an average risk of breast cancer. Reflecting these data, the American Cancer Society (ACS) recently issued new guidelines recommending women to start mammograms at 45 rather than the previously recommended age of 40.

Challenge winners will be awarded:


- 1st Place - \$40,000
